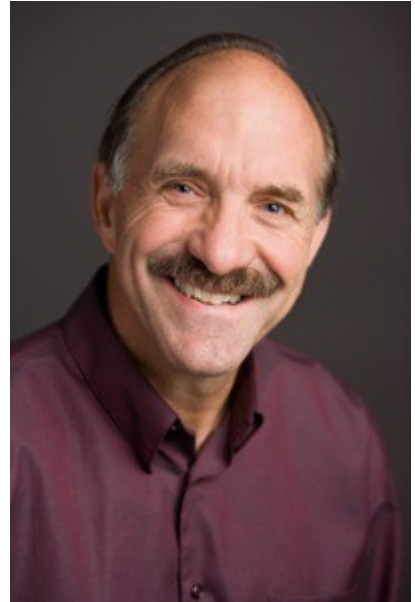


## Azusafest Will Honor Lou Engle of 'The Call' with the William Seymour Award

The widely acclaimed International William J. Seymour Award, which is given to senior leaders who exhibit the characteristics of the humble servant, William J. Seymour.
